

CEMETERIES AND CHURCHYARDS WHERE: DOWNTOWN CHARLESTON

Charleston boasts some of the nation's oldest cemeteries. with funeral art dating to the late 1600s. Exploring the Holy City's churchyards and cemeteries is a moving way to walk through time. Here lie prominent statesmen and historical figures, and here lie beloved infants, decorated veterans, distinguished preachers and regular people "sacred to the memory" of those whom they left behind.

EXPLORING CHARLESTON'S CITY MARKET WHERE: 188 MEETING ST.

Visit the open-air Charleston City Market where you can find an intriguing array of local vendors, many selling handcrafted items (jewelry, soaps and perfumes, candles, decor and more). Pick up a classic Charleston souvenir like a hand-woven sweetgrass basket!



WALK THE BRIDGE WHERE: ARTHUR RAVENEL, JR. BRIDGE

Call it what you will—"the Bridge," "the Cooper River Bridge," "the Ravenel Bridge" or to some who still remember the harrowingly narrow "Old Bridges" it's the "New Bridge," the iconic structure is a wonder to behold, and a great place to walk or run. When the Bridge opened, it became the longest cable-stayed bridge of its time in North America and the tallest structure in SC.

A TWO-WHEELED. SELF-GUIDED TOUR WHERE: ZERO GEORGE

SECOND SUNDAYS ON KING

WHERE: KING STREET

Every Second Sunday of the month, the city's scenic and main thoroughfare gets a reprieve from traffic and visitors can enjoy a King Street stroll from a new (or really old!) perspective. From south of Calhoun Street and Marion Square, King Street is blocked off to vehicles (including bikes) and store owners, musicians and vendors create a festive atmosphere to shop, eat, drink and socialize.

DOCK STREET THEATRE

WHERE: 135 CHURCH ST.

Known as America's First Theatre, Dock Street was the nation's first building to be constructed solely for the purpose American art, including of hosting live performance. Plan to catch a show, or just pop in during the day for a glance at the beautiful, intimate theater space. Head down the street after the show to enjoy a glass of wine at Bin 152!

GIBBES MUSEUM OF ART

WHERE: 135 MEETING ST.

The Gibbes Museum of Art is home to an excellently curated collection of the foremost collection of miniature portraits, that incorporates the story of Charleston. Don't miss the garden in the back!

JOHNS ISLAND

Photo Op alert! This ancient live oak tree is thought to be one of the oldest living things in the country. "You have to see it to believe it"!

CHARLESTON RIVERDOGS

WHERE: 360 FISHBURNE ST.

A night at "The Joe" is a fun, wholesome outing for the whole family. Charleston's hometown minor league team has one of the most beautiful stadiums in the country, so grab a gourmet hotdog and some boiled peanuts and enjoy!

SOUTH CAROLINA AOUARIUM

WHERE: 100 AQUARIUM WHARF

Visit the aquarium and watch the astonishing underwater world come to life! Don't miss the Sea Turtle Care Center to learn about how the community is helping to rescue, rehabilitate and release sick or injured sea turtles.

EDMONDSTON-ALSTON HOUSE WHERE: 21 EAST BATTERY

We love this historic house museum which provides a beautifully accurate representation for how planter families lived. The home is ideally situated to enjoy sweeping views of the Charleston Harbor, including Fort Sumter.

THE CHARLESTON MUSEUM

WHERE: 360 MEETING ST.

The Charleston Museum is one of the oldest museums in the United States, and home to a highly regarded collection that includes historic artifacts, natural history displays, decorative arts, textiles and costumes, and two historic Charleston houses.

XIAO BAO BISCUIT WHERE: 224 RUTLEDGE AVE.

For all its culinary gusto, Charleston was lacking on the ethnic food front, until Xiao Bao shook things up and converted an old gas station into the go-to spot for all things spicy, intriguing and robustly flavorful. Asian street food on a sweet Charleston street corner.

LEON'S FINE POULTRY & OYSTER SHOP WHERE: 698 KING ST.

A local favorite, Leon's serves up fresh local seafood, oysters and the best fried chicken in town— joint a short walk away on trust us. Did someone say Frosé? lower King Street.

CALLIE'S HOT LITTLE BISCUIT WHERE: 476 1/2 KING ST.

There's nothing more southern, and more decadent, than a fresh-baked, fluffy, perfectly golden biscuit. And no one makes them more perfectly than the crew at Callie's. Plus, it's the cutest teeny storefront AND the best deal in town: ~\$6 for a sampler three-pack. Though we're betting you'll want more.
